## CREATIVE HANDS-ON FESTIVAL ...

A couple of years ago, Barbara and Anne began thinking about applying for a federal grant. After much discussion the decision was made to focus primarily on senior retirees – individuals who are interested in finding a hobby/activity to occupy some free time. And so, the idea of a Creative Hands-On Festival was born!! They worked long and hard on the necessary application paper work and it paid off with a substantial grant.

In the spring of 2019, the two of them started planning, organizing, advertising, recruiting and, with great determination and a lot of time, energy, and some frustration, put together a very successful event the second weekend of September.

Over 700 people attended the three-day event. 22% of them were identified as seniors and this reflects only those who filled in the questionnaire. 55 individuals found a guild to join and over 200 said they tried something new. Over 80 took one or more classes. There were classes and hands-on activities in: painting, felting, doll making, carving, powertex masks, embroidery, knitting, card making, scrapbooking, rug hooking, quilting, wood turning, pottery, gourds, glass fusion, spinning, weaving, beading, basketry, paddle carving, drawing, and zentangle.

The gourd hands-on table was a popular place for all age groups – male, female, young & old. People were able to make gourd ornaments decorated with alcohol ink – a fun activity for festival goers and the Kawartha Gourders (Patti, Janet, Michelle, Marilyn & Sharron) who manned the table. Janet demonstrated some rimming techniques and Anne worked on pine needles and raffia.

The guilds, individual artisans who demonstrated, volunteers, donators of silent auction items and door prizes, individuals who taught classes, Gerri's art store that donated kids corner colouring supplies – so many people made this a huge success – all deserve a *thank-you*! Without Barbara and Anne, this event would never have happened so...... a huge thank-you and KUDOs to them!

### KAWARTHA GOURDERS

The Kawartha Gourders have again had a very busy three months. We have had a lot of fun doing various workshops. Most of us took the Rain stick class in June but didn't finish until later in the summer. We also made Ocean Drums in August and Anne taught a beginner carving class for several of the newer members who hadn't carved before. The new facility with its special area for *dirty/dusty* work is great. Not only does it keep the dust out of the paint and ink, but it keeps the noise at a minimum as well.

A good number of people made penguins, and Barbara with her experience showed everyone a wonderful way to paint the penguin wings and make the beak and feet. The resulting colony had lots of variation and creativity – two penguins even have fish in their beaks. Working with hot glue to draw trees produced several great looking gourds and generated a new interesting technique for a few people.





Barbara, Anne and Chris also did two children's workshops (rattles and masks) during the potters' camp week. The kids had lots of fun and, of course, the teachers did as well.



Several of the group volunteered at the Hands-On Festival and a few had booths at different craft shows/fairs and

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area studio tours.

We have a few excellent workshops lined up for the rest of the year in addition to preparing for ARTISANity the first weekend in November and making ornaments to decorate a tree for the Five Counties Children's Centre fundraiser.

Everyone is looking forward to a fun Christmas get-together and of course, there is always time for socializing and *eating chocolate*!

# WORKSHOPS (COMPLETED)





## **HOT GLUE TREE ON GOURD**

This tutorial is a variation of the original *Faux Metallic Tree* workshop taught by Betty Bloomfield at 2019 Pennsylvania Gourd Gathering

Gourd (Cleaned on outside) – If cut open, cleaned and sealed on inside as well as

outside

**MATERIALS:** 

Pencil

Hot Glue Gun and Glue Sticks (If you have a glue gun on which you can change tips, have a fine tip available) Acrylic Paint (your choice of colours) or Memory Ink

Metallic Paint, Metallic Rubs, Micro Powders

Paint Brushes, Cosmetic Pads (for applying the memory ink), Sea Sponge (for applying paint)

Wax paper squares, water container

Toothpicks/popsicle sticks

Scissors

Varnish

### DIRECTIONS:

### **Preparing Gourd:**

- Clean outside of gourd. Condition with Formula 49 if necessary.
- If you wish, remove top of gourd, clean inside, sand smooth and paint/seal the inside with varnish.
- Draw a light, rough outline of a tree on outside of gourd with pencil. This will give you a guideline for the placement of the hot glue. If you wish you may transfer a tree of life design to the gourd using tracing paper.
- I like to put a light coat of memory ink on the gourd before applying the glue but this is optional.

### Applying the Glue:

- Plug in the glue gun. Be sure to position it over a piece of paper so when the glue drips it does so on the paper, not the table.
- When the glue starts to drip, practice using the glue gun on a gourd shard or a piece of paper to make limbs and a little trunk. If using different tips, test the various sizes.
- When comfortable, start applying the glue to your tree trunk. Build it up in layers until you are happy with the thickness. Don't be afraid to have ridges and bumps bark is not smooth. Bring the roots out the bottom making them a bit ragged and crooked. Then do the limbs.
- If you wish you can make grass, clouds, leaves, birds or whatever your imagination can come up with.

#### **Adding Colour:**

- When you are finished with the glue gun, paint the entire gourd in the colour(s) of your choice, including over the glue.
- Paint the trunks and limbs gold or colour of your choice (I like to use copper & highlight with gold). Paint the grass and other glued areas in colours of your choice. Metallic paint will result in a glow.
- If you want, rub micro powder around the tree to give it a shimmering effect.

#### Finishing:

- Spray varnish over the entire gourd.
- Leave to dry.

Page 2 of the tutorial has examples of *Trees of Life*. I would suggest looking on the internet if you require ideas for different trees.

In the last CGS newsletter, Barb Powell in Victoria, B.C. received some helpful hints from Barbara B., on how to camouflage the crack in a gourd. Here is the result of that help. How beautiful is this!!!

Wood-burned, transparent acrylics, dyed pine needle trim. Thanks to Barbara for giving me some valuable tips on how to save a creation with a crack.
